

CURRICULUM ENHANCEMENTS THROUGH VISITS

KS 1 pupils visited Durham Cathedral as part of their History study.



The children were exceptionally well-behaved during this visit and received glowing reports from the staff of the cathedral. Every pupil received a merit for their merit cards.









Year 5/6 pupils visited the Victorian Tunnels in Newcastle as part of their History study. The children met Basil, a 90 year old gentleman who was evacuated from Newcastle when he was 10. He shared personal memories of his time during the war; the children and staff were fascinated! The children also visited Seven Stories and Ouseburn Farm. Everyone's behaviour was superb and a credit to the school.

KEEPING SAFE AND HEALTHY AT ROSEBERRY

KS 2 pupils had the opportunity to learn how to stay safe whilst out and about on their bikes. Many pupils were awarded certificates and badges for their excellent work from the Bikeability Team.

Year 5 pupils learned a lot from their weekly visitors from various organisations such as The Dogs Trust and the Civil Contingencies Service, which ended in February. Here are some of their thoughts...

I learned that flytipping is when a person collects mounds of rubbish and puts it in a place to hide it. (Kaicee) I learned that if you fall over into dog poo, you might get an eye infection because the dog might have worms. That's why you must get your dogs wormed. (Chloe) Dogs feel lonely and scared when they're left outside a shop. (Ella)

The police told us that fly-tippers can get a £60 - £1000 fine. (Abigail)

Safer Internet Day was celebrated this month with the theme 'Free to be Me'. Pupils were taught that anyone can fake their online identity and they need to be sure who they might be chatting to. Thanks to Miss Blakeney for coordinating this important online safety work.

Sporting activities obviously helps keep children healthy. Our subscription to the Schools Sports Partnership enables our children to participate in many sporting activities.

ENVIRONMENTAL AWARENESS

Year 4 pupils have been heavily involved in looking after our local environment by participating in a litter pick and they have been working with Oases on an eco-brick sculpture (see below). Thanks to parents for their support with this worthwhile project. Pupils also learned how waste has changed over time by interviewing members of the older generation. The pupils then presented their work to the rest of the school and their parents in an assembly.

Please note some questions were not answered as parents felt they did not have enough experience or did not know enough to give an informed answer. Some percentages, therefore, do not add to 100%.

Positive comments:

"Pleased with Roseberry so far – my daughter is extremely happy in her class and loves attending breakfast club. Communication is excellent and I find Classdojo very useful for this"

"Reception class is fantastic and I am very happy with the progress my child's making." "Although my child has only been at Roseberry for a month, she is very happy and settled in great."

"Communication is good in terms of Classdojo, text messages... overall happy with the school and teaching staff are a credit"

Concerns:

- "A lot of parents smoke and swear outside the school. This is mentioned on Classdojo quite regularly but perhaps another method could be employed. Not sure what could be done really which is a shame."
- "Year 3 is currently on 3rd teacher of the year... I don't feel the children can be getting a good standard of teaching over the full year"

"concerns about pupil premium..."

"Bad behaviour is always overlooked and never dealt with appropriately... further negative comments relating to certain groups of staff..."

"difficult to arrange time off work for achiever assemblies with one night's notice...attendance officers should not conduct house visits so prematurely in the term especially when school send child home poorly..."

"Class dojo is rarely updated, therefore I only find out about progress at parents' evenings...behavioural problems ... never seem to have a full time teacher – again throughout the years, not just Year 5"

Thank you to everyone for your comments. We pride ourselves on taking parental concerns seriously and remember our motto is "Together we achieve more!" With regard to the above,

- Pupils have made posters about smoking which are displayed around the school premises for parents to see.
- Teachers' notice periods mean our new teacher cannot start until after Easter. We will hold a meet & greet session so all Year 3 parents can meet Mr Neasham who is employed on a permanent contract.
- Pupil Premium the majority of the money goes towards staffing costs e.g. parent support advisor and teaching assistants. (The £1320 we receive for each child, when divided by 190 days = £6.94 a day)
- Just a reminder needed that all teachers' are entitled to 10% PPA and time to fulfil subject leadership responsibilities. This is a statutory requirement. This is why your child's teacher cannot be in class 5 days a week.
- Achiever of the Week pupils can't be chosen until Thursdays. This
 has been reviewed in the past following parents' comments about short

notice but staff felt it was too much of a delay for children to be discussing their achievements from the previous week. We appreciate it's inconvenient for working parents so if anyone has any suggestions, we'd like to hear them. You could message us via Classdojo.

• The vast majority of parents and all staff feel negative behaviour is dealt with in a timely and appropriate manner, according to the school's behaviour and positive relationships policy. However, if any parents feel unhappy with the policy, please pass your comments on to your child's class teacher and we will try to resolve the concerns. Again, quoting our motto, "Together we achieve more!" we believe it is important to contact the school if you have any individual concerns.
